Executive Director's Column

Dear Friends,

Spring is here, and we have so many exciting and fun opportunities for everyone! We have dinners and programs scheduled. What a fun spring we have had.

Our Gator Clot Trot was April 15, 2023, and it was a lot of fun. We chose a new venue, and the weather was perfect. Special shout out to our wonderful volunteers and sponsors who helped make the event a success. We are already thinking about our 2024 event.

Advocacy was again at the forefront as we tried to get the accumulator adjuster bill over the finish line, but we were not able to make it happen. We have a great group of advocacy ambassadors ready to take on the Florida Legislature to get the bill passed in 2024.

What is a copay accumulator adjuster program? Thousands of Floridians with chronic health conditions rely on copay assistance to help them pay out-of-pocket costs for expensive specialty medicines. But many insurers have stopped counting copay assistance toward annual deductibles and the out-of-pocket limit, leaving patients with serious illnesses to foot the bill. These practices harm the most vulnerable Americans—those who need the most help affording their care—and make existing health disparities even worse. When insurers don't count copay assistance toward a patient's deductible or out-of-pocket limit, patients continue to owe that money (even though they've paid it), leaving them facing an enormous bill when they try to refill a prescription or get other health care. That leaves many patients with tough choices between paying for necessities like rent and food or paying for their prescriptions. Too many patients delay care or stop taking their medication, which can lead to serious complications of their illness and even greater health care costs.

Guilt in Mothers of Children with Hemophilia Focus of New Study

Researchers from Children's Healthcare of Atlanta and Emory University recently published the results of a small study investigating the subject of guilt in mothers of children with hemophilia (CWH).

Anonymous electronic surveys were distributed to 291 mothers of CWH from May to October 2021, which measured feelings of guilt along with potential contributing factors, subsequent coping strategies, and perception of their child's life satisfaction.

In all, 87 mothers completed the survey. The mean age of respondents was 41.6 years and their CWH was a mean age of 13.3 years. While mothers indicated perceptions of their child's life satisfaction that didn't vary appreciably from the general population, 40% did indicate increased guilt. The most commonly cited reasons associated with this guilt were passing on the X chromosome associated with the condition and putting their child through painful infusions. The most common coping strategies were accessing social support, self-education, and connecting with other mothers of CWH in the inherited bleeding disorders community.



The authors emphasized the need for healthcare providers to "tactfully" provide anticipatory guidance and counseling for these mothers. They also suggested some positive takeaways.

"Community immersion was beneficial, as other mothers in the community served as a source of social and educational support. Most mothers did not report guilt, illustrating the adaptability and resilience of the hemophilia community," concluded the authors.


The study, "The Emotional Experience of Mothers of Children with Hemophilia: Maternal Guilt, Effective Coping Strategies and Resilience within the Hemophilia Community," was published online in the journal Haemophilia.

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
